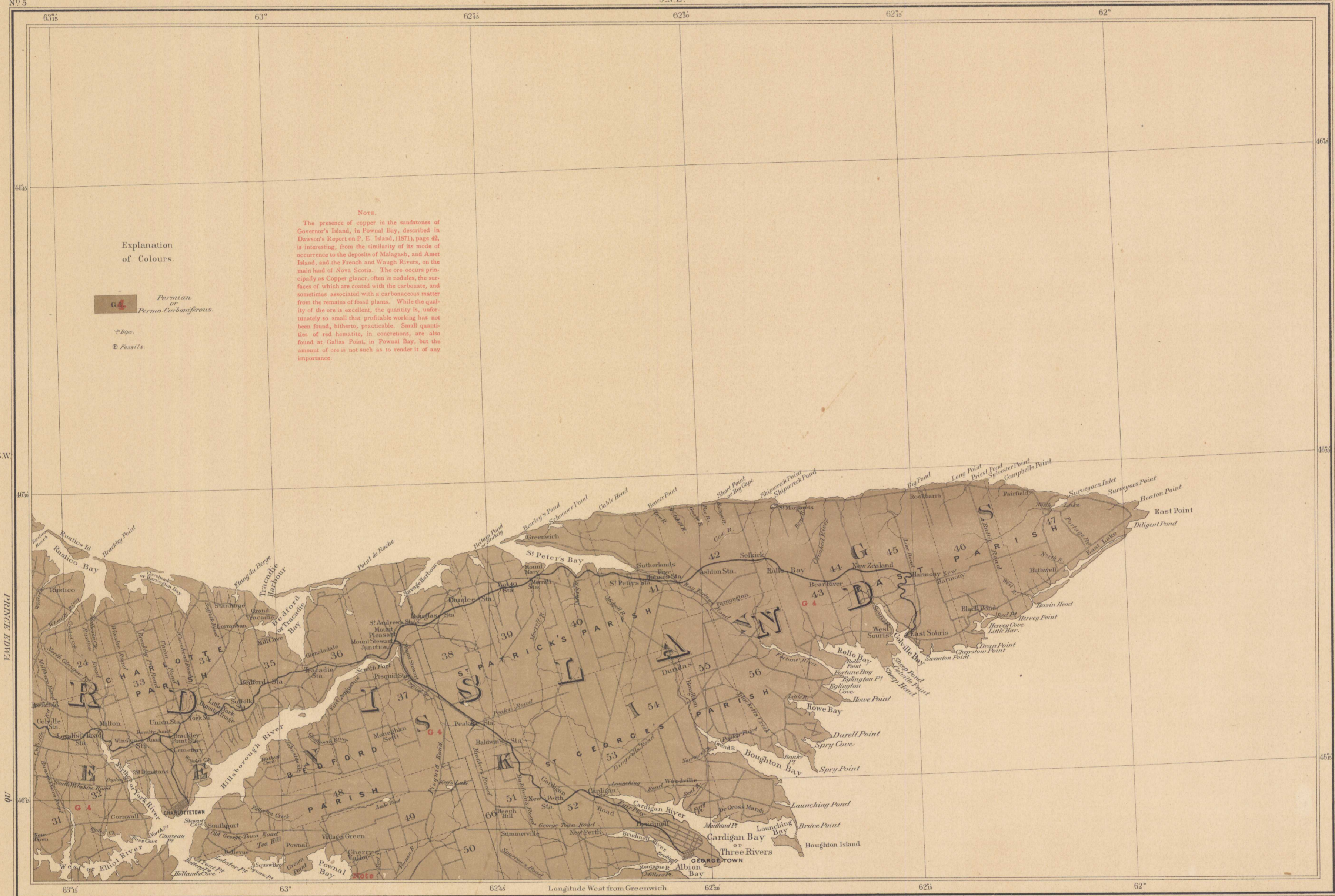

**NOTE.**  
The presence of copper in the sandstones of Governor's Island, in Pownal Bay, described in Dawson's Report on P. E. Island, (1871), page 42, is interesting, from the similarity of its mode of occurrence to the deposits of Malagash, and Annet Island, and the French and Waugh Rivers, on the main land of Nova Scotia. The ore occurs principally as Copper glance, often in nodules, the surfaces of which are coated with the carbonate, and sometimes associated with a carbonaceous matter from the remains of fossil plants. While the quality of the ore is excellent, the quantity is, unfortunately so small that profitable working has not been found, hitherto, practicable. Small quantities of red hematite, in concretions, are also found at Gallias Point, in Pownal Bay, but the amount of ore is not such as to render it of any importance.

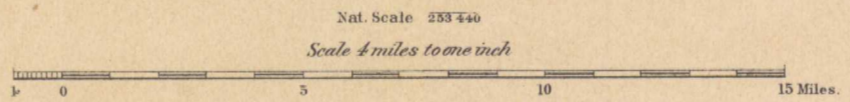
