


CODE	NAME	FEATURE	EXPLANATION
CK78	Qikiqtaalujuarusiq	Island	A big island next to Qikiqtaalujuaq (CK79)
CK79	Qikiqtaalujuaq	Island	A very big island
CK79b	Kangilitatqut	Island	An island that connects to the mainland at low tide
CK89	Aupauktaaq	Ilands	A place referring to the reddish color of the islands, a place where the rivers are formed by the wind
CK89b	dju-b	Stream	A place referring to more than one stream feeding into the inlet, a marshy area
CK98	Savuja	Lake	Unknown
CL53	Itinniq	Passage	A passage used in the winter that can be approached in either direction
CL53b	Sarva	Polynya	A place where there is open water all year round
CL53c	Itsivajuj	Peninsula	A place that resembles someone sitting, a place where ancestors sat and waited for game; a place where there are lots of seals
CL54	Iquutitataituaq	Islands	A place where there is no soil to wipe your skin
CL55	Upingivik	Island	A gathering spot in spring to hunt at the sarma (polynya)
CL55b	Sarva	Polynya	A place where there is open water all year round
CL55c	Quiju	Island	A place that appears to be shrinking
CL55d	Usuvik	Ilands	An island group that resembles a penis and testicle
CL56	Tasiujaaluk	Lake	A large lake that has two small passages, no big currents, a place where seals like to swim
CL56b	Sarva	Polynya	A place where there is open water all year round
CL56c	Sarva	Polynya	A place where there is open water all year round
CL56e	Sarva	Polynya	A place where there is open water all year round
CL57	Qivianganiq	Inlet	A place where there is open water all year round
CL58	Qivianganip	Lake	An inlet where you have to turn your head to see

CL60	Kuugualua	Island	An island that protects the coastline, a water passage for safe travel
CL60b	Ipiqtuq	Peninsula	A place that resembles a sharp point
CL62	Turiutuq	Peninsula	A place referring to the sound of many seagulls
CL63	Qimirjuaq	Hill	A steep place that resembles the back of a human or animal
CL64	Mimiralluk	Island	An island that resembles the tendorlof a caribou
CL64b	Akililuulit	Ilands	A group of small islands relative to the ones around it, a place named by people camping at Umiakuvik (CL73)
CL66	Asungsangaa	Hill	A place where rocks are formed by the wind
CL66b	Qikiqtaaluk	Island	A big island
CL66c	Tuurngatqalik	Island	Unknown
CL69	Qivianganip	Lake	A lake above Qivianganip Iqalupillinga (CL94), "upper lake"
CL73	Umiakuvik	Anchorage	A place where you can anchor your boat for safety
CL73b	Iqalukpiligapik	Lake	A small lake named for its big fish
CL73c	Qimirjuaq Nungunninguaq	Hill	A place that refers to the eastern most tip of Qimirjuaq (CL63)
CL80	Qunqniq	Tidal ice zone	A place where there are ice cracks along the coast, a place where fish travel under the land to the upper lake
CL84	Qinngu	Inlet	A place where people used to camp at the head of the inlet
CL84b	Nunaturiq	Camp	A place where Inuit have camped for many years
CL91	Qatsituuq	Lake	A lake located inland, "at the top"
CL94	Qinginguq Iqalupillinga	Fish run	A place where the fish migrate to the sea in the fall
DL09	Pamiuja	Peninsula	A place resembling a tail
DL00	Quuqutsaaq	Pass	A narrow passage through very steep mountains
DL35	Sikuuaq	Area	A place where the land resembles ice in the winter

Example of method used to reference traditional names to the 100 000m grid:
Square: Read letters of 100 000m square VE
Easting: Read number on grid line immediately to left of point. 5
Northing: Read number on grid line immediately below point. 9
Grid Reference: V59

If there is more than one name within a 100000m grid square, subsequent names will be assigned lower case letter suffixes.
Example: V59b, V59c...


