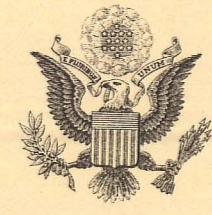


INTERNATIONAL BOUNDARY

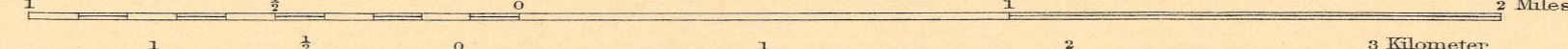
