



Hi Jackie (& Tim):

I wonder what happened here. In this case the decision sheet is correct, not the map. I have attached a copy of the decision sheet. I have also attached a JPG. There are three points on it. No. 1 is the correct Spy Hill. If we can assume the communications tower is at the highest point, this would put the coordinates at 51 09 24.7 and 114 13 25.3 (Lsd 3, Sec. 28, Twp. 25, Rge 2, W of 5th Meridian.) This is at a slight variance with the decision sheet. No. 2 is where it was located on the map at the time the decision was made. Why, I don't know. That was my doing. No. 3 is the location of the old label of Spy Hill.

I hope this clears up this one.

Hi Jackie,

There appears to be an error with the decision for Spy Hill (IAKSC) in Alberta on 82 O/1.

The prision of 1 March 2000 on 82 O/1 shows that the latitude for Spy Hill should be 51 09 25 but this can not be a prize in relation to the delineation provided with the decision list on the last page. If the delineation provided is correct then the latitude should actually be approximately 51 14 50. The longitude appears to be fine.

Could you contact Alberta to see if they agree and if so the data base will need to be fixed and perhaps a new decision list will need to be provided by Alberta to correct this error.



Hi Tim,

As discussed with you a few days ago, the record for IAGVV, Marlborough Park, an urban community, has been identified as an error. It is likely a duplicate for IATRY, which is located on a different map sheet and at different coordinates.

The location of IATRY reflects the information on the city map of Calgary provided to the Secretariat in 1998, and is the correct record. I have changed the status of IAGVV to B3 (deleted) and added an explanatory note to the origin of the record.

I hope this resolves the matter for you. Let me know if there are problems or questions.



Marlborough Park - IAGVV Marlborough Park - IATRY


The only thing that has me a bit confused is the fact that IAGVV has a longitude value that is 4 full minutes to the west of the IATRY record? If these are duplicate records I have no idea why the coordinates are so much different, it's very odd. I can't imagine there are 2 different Marlborough Parks within the city of Calgary and so close together, I'm sure this is just a mistake and the correct record should be IATRY and that IAGVV should be deleted. Checking the Urban Community maps provided by Merrily in 1997 it seems very clear to me that Marlborough Park is on 82 P/4 not 82 O/1.

If you could clear this issue up with Alberta and delete one of the two records it would be much appreciated.



I'm cleaning up a few things left behind by Karen - now off to her GPDP training for two years.

With respect to Alyth (on 82 O/1) -

The request for information on this name came from the Calgary Public Library. They called it Alyth Yards and that's what it shows as on the map they sent us. Alyth is not and never has been, to the best of my knowledge, a subdivision.

Alyth (Station) was adopted in Place Names of Alberta, 1928. As it apparently was "unfindable", the name was coded as C4 which just ensured that the name remained off NTS maps until it was sorted out. This happened with several names. When they have been "found", these names have been returned to their original status.

Alyth is still an official name because it was never rescinded. If Alyth is a Former Railway Point (which you said it was in your e-mail of 9 August 1996 to Karen), then really all we need from you is a decision changing the status of Alyth from Station to Former Railway Point. The Status code would be A4. Alyth Yards should be added as a B1 cross-reference name to Alyth.

To answer the rest of your questions about this. Is there a need for this - it's an offical name, so it should be so entered in the CGNDB. Is it an active railway point - we don't know.

With respect to data base categories -

You should have received or will shortly receive an update to the CGNDB Records Manual. The section on status codes has been revamped and is now in an easy to read table.

Correspondence on Alyth might possibly exist on 82 O, 82 O/SE, and 82 O/1, as well as on 82 O/1a. Sounds like you were on the right track in your investigations. However, we would normally search from the smallest scale map (82 O) to the largest (82 O/1a) because maps were generally made in that order. So 82 O/1a would likely have more recent name information than 82 O. Maps are no longer made at the 1:25 000 scale (82 O/1a), so if you cannot find anything there, the best file to look on should be 82 O/1. But given that Alyth existed in 1928, 82 O is likely the file you want.

Place Names of Alberta, 1928 (out of print, so you probably don't have access to it) says that this CPR staion near Calgary, 24-1-5, was named after Alyth, a village in Perthshire, Scotland. Unfortunately, it does not give the year of establishment. Such information is usual for post offices and stations in this book.

The Canadian Geographical Names Data Base (CGNDB) contains this information, too, but also has an alternate origin - unsubstantiated and, therefore, probably not likely. This is - that it was named after the first white child born in Calgary. The CGNDB also says that Alyth appears in the Canadian Guide (or Canadian Shipper's Guide) but no one was able to locate it on the map.


Alyth is not listed on our Internet site because of this. It is in the CGNDB but with a status which will not allow it to appear in gazetteers or on the Internet.

By place name books, do you mean the series published by the University of Calgary Press and the Friends of Geographical Names of Alberta?

If you are able to do so, we would appreciate it if you could identify Alyth on a piece of 82 O/1 or even 82 O/1a and fax it to us. Our fax number is 613 943-8282.

We hope that this information is useful to you and that you are able, in turn, to help us with the location of Alyth.

Dig into your history for city street names

Re "Cabot deserves more recognition than Columbus," by Grant MacEwan, Herald Sept. 16.

Three cheers for Grant MacEwan who points out "The choice of place names deserves more thought than commonly received. Too hurriedly, we settle for too many meaningless names."

He adds that public servants, in their rush to select names for new streets, suburbs, and parks, have often made selections which are "no more than high-sounding words without significance."

MacEwan points out the city's public servants could well draw their inspiration for new names from a reading of Canadian history. I highly agree. What better way to make a link between our present and past than by choosing to honor the "hundreds of great names in our history?"

Nearly a century ago Mount Royal in southwest Calgary led the way. The promoters of the new district, which is named after the "mountain" in Montreal, appropriately chose a Quebec theme. Mount Royal has streets named after the great French leaders, Champlain, Laval, Frontenac; and the post-Conquest British governors of the old province of Quebec - men such as Carleton, Haldimand and Hope.

While prizing Mount Royal's initiative, one danger must be noted. The public servants

choosing names for suburbs, streets and parks, must know well their Canadian history.

Unfortunately, one embarrassing slip-up is present in the naming of streets in Mount Royal, namely the intersection at which Carleton meets Dorchester.

Whoever chose these names failed to realize Carleton cannot meet Dorchester, for Carleton is Dorchester. He cannot meet himself. After Sir Guy Carleton was re-appointed for a second term as governor of Quebec in 1786, he obtained the title of Baron Dorchester.

I propose that the city naming authorities make a preliminary selection of historic names from the four volumes of the second edition of The Canadian Encyclopedia. In consultation with local historians, public servants could draw up a list of suggestions for consideration.

To draw public attention to the new emphasis to be given to our country's past, I propose that city council correct the existing error of Carleton meeting Dorchester. Montreal itself provides a model to follow, for it too once had a street named Dorchester. After the death of a prominent Quebec leader three years ago it renamed its Dorchester Avenue after him. City council might well debate the possibility or renaming our Dorchester Street after Rene Levesque.

made was the importance of early facsimiles, generally in books, which themselves are of such a date as to be 'antiques'.

Caroline Batchelor displayed an impressively large map of the Northern Hemisphere from Thomson's General Atlas of 1816. Those present who were well aware of her long-standing interest in maps of Africa were not surprised when she drew attention to a feature of many such contemporary maps, the mythical Mountains of Kong, a chain supposed to stretch across the middle of the continent, shown prominently in this particular example together with an equally fallacious course of the river Niger.

David Webb then laid down his camera, which as IMCoS photographer he had been putting to good use, and produced a diverse range of modern map curios. First a fund-raising tea towel identifying the destination of the Sheffield University Mackenzie River Expedition 1995; then a china mug from Norway featuring the far north island of Spitzbergen as an arctic tourist destination: then one of three horse brasses commemorating the efforts of the British Falkland Islands task force in 1982. To make it clear he had not abandoned his well-known interest in road maps, he showed an unusual volume of Peterson's Roads. With no fewer than three title pages, bound together were the 1794 edition, a 1792 dictionary of distance tables, and Cary's county maps of 1791.

Alan Bartlett displayed two maps of Trincomalee in Ceylon to demonstrate how history could repeat itself in maps. The first was from a survey of the bay and our ordered by Admiral Cornish in 1762 and probably published around the

turn of the century. The second was a secret map from the 1940s, zincograp-ghed onto glazed cotton. Both showed in considerable detail all the military fortifications and defence positions against invasions that in the event never took place. In the first instance it was a French on-slaught that was feared, in the second a Japanese.

Finally, Rosemary Vracas brought the meeting back to the present day. She passed round some colourful printed paper placemaps which she had come across at a motel restaurant in Belgium. They featured a pictorial map of Europe, with a border of figures in various dress, reminiscent of Speed and similar period maps.

The meeting concluded with everyone more than satisfied with the evening's proceedings, vowing to return next year, and hoping that any members from outside UK who happen to be in or within reach of London at the time will make a particular point of coming along and sharing in the enjoyment.

I very much endorse and commend the suggestion of the Chairman in the last IMCoS Journal (Winter 1994) that the IMCoS take the initiative in assembling a world-wide record of the rarest known printed maps.

I would like to suggest that the responsibility for organising this project is put out to the country-by-country IMCoS representatives: not that they need feel they have to undertake all the research themselves, but they are usually in a good position to cajole or persuade the best qualified person locally for each national area. I should be glad to volunteer to develop a list for the rarest British Isles and World maps. At the same time, suggestions from all IMCoS members in relation to any maps they know of will be welcome.

There need not be an exact uniformity of record, but sufficient basic information should be provided to identify the map unambiguously (e.g., title, date, size and number of sheets if multi-sheet map, names of maker, engraver and/or publisher; also known locations).

The benefits will be widespread. Quite often it is difficult to confirm locations cited by long-standing authorities, particularly if national boundaries have changed. A choice of locations is often useful when a photograph is wanted and the hitherto known copies are damaged or inaccessible. Unsuspected different states may exist. And sometimes it is not appreciated how rare a particular map is, so that inclusion in the IMCoS Rarissima list may well bring to light fresh examples from both institutional and private sources.

It may seem strange to be replying to my own query (Autumn 1994) but... a very important reader of the essay was Margaret Wilkes, Head of the Map Library at the National Library of Scotland. At her suggestion I received from Mr Ian A. Fraser of the Scotlish Place Names Survey in the School of Scotlish Studies, Edinburgh University the following comment:

"Calgary in Mull certainly does not mean 'clear running water'. It is not Gaelic but Norse, as indeed are many place-names in Mull, after the Vikings colonised many of the Argyll islands in the period 820-1260 AD. The final part is simple enough, being from the Old Norse gardr 'enclosure', a term that was applied to grazing farms surrounded by what was probably a turf wall to protect livestock. The word is borrowed into the Gaelic of the Western Isles as gearraidh and is still used to describe the enclosed land immediately outwith the arable, and designed to hold sheep and cattle within easy reach of the township. The first element in Calgary is less obvious. Some scholars suggest O.N. [Old Norse] kald 'cold', while others favour a contemporary Norse personal name, Kali. Both fit reasonably well, but 'cold enclosure' sounds reasonable to me.


Glackugary was probably the old form of Calgary, or it may have been deserted since Pont's map was drawn up in 1590–1600. In any case, glac is Gaelic for 'ravine' and the second part is another Norse name Ugary, with exactly the same ending as Calgary. The second part may be Old Norse utar 'outer', giving utar-gardr 'outer enclosure' which in a Gaelic-speaking version could easily have been shortened to Ugary. We don't know the exact location of this place but it is on the south side of the river and may well apply to the gully that runs into it from the south, near the mouth."

My second source of information was a

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not-widely-known publication prepared here in Calgary by the Glenbow Museum some years ago. It reports early forms of the name Calgary as 'Cala-Ghearridh' (similar to Fraser's version), 'Calligourie', 'Callagorie' and 'Calligory'. I have enclosed a copy for your library.

For my part, being a Blaeu enthusiast and collector, I favour the Pont/Blaeu version of 'Glackug-gary'. I also speculated that the ending may have come from the French 'gare' in a name given by the Normans to Calgary Bay. We will never really know!

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The Calgary Olympics

The rinks, trails and jumps are ready, but will the weather cooperate?


N FEBRUARY 13, 1988, the XV Winter Olympic Games, the first to be held in Canada, will open in Calgary. For 16 days, while athletes, visitors and 1.5 billion television viewers marvel at the feats of the best winter athletes from 60 nations, organizers will be continually casting wary glances at the sky, crossing their fingers and silently praying for winter weather. Contrary to the popular vision of Canada as a land of harsh winters, this corner of the country possesses a fickle mid-winter phenomenon called a chinook. (See box on page 33.) In just a few hours, a chinook's warm wind can turn a carefully groomed downhill ski run into muddy slush.


Given that Calgary's average February snow cover is only 6.8 centimetres to begin with, officials could hardly ignore the potentially disastrous effect of

a chinook. Thus much of the massive \$1-billion investment — more than five times the cost at Sarajevo, Yugoslavia, in 1984 and 10 times that of Lake Placid, N.Y., in 1980 — has been devoted to weatherproofing the games. For the first time in Winter Olympic history, all event sites, from the downhill slopes of Mount Allan to the cross-country ski trails of Canmore, will have a battery of snow-making equipment and vast stockpiles of snow assembled weeks before the games actually begin.

From the start, the Olympic Organizing Committee - or OCO, for Olympiques Calgary Olympics, as it is universally called — sought what it calls an Olympic legacy. Seeking to avoid the spectre of municipal debt, taxpayer anguish and corruption like that of the 1976 Montreal Summer Games, it skilfully lined up generous financing and support from Ottawa, the Alberta government and, to a lesser extent, the City of Calgary.

All the sites were built specially for

8 games, with two exceptions: non Stadium on the University of Calgary campus and the nearby Foothills Arena. The stadium, the longtime home of the Calgary Stampeders football team, will be used for the opening and closing ceremonies. To accommodate these events, \$15.7 million was spent on renovations and seating expansion to a temporary capacity of 60,000 for the games, with 38,000 permanent seats to remain. The arena, renamed Father David Bauer Olympic Arena in honour of the coach of Canada's first national hockey team, is the official home of Canada's current national team; it will be used for shorttrack speed skating. This is a demonstration event, along with curling and freestyle skiing, but the legacy for the city is an upgraded hockey arena. It received \$2.9 million in renovations.

Perhaps the best example of Olympic legacy is the new enclosed speedskating oval, a five-minute walk from McMahon Stadium. Financed to the tune of \$40 million by the federal government, the 26,000-square-metre building is about the size of four soccer fields (220 metres by 90 metres), houses a 400-metre speed-skating track and two hockey rinks, and seats 4,000 spectators. While it has been described as looking like "a great grey slug on the landscape", architect Graham McCourt has softened its profile by covering the roof with sheet metal sections coated with baked white porcelain enamel, similar to material used on the space shuttle. After the Olympics, it will be used for hockey, figure skating and public skating, as well as for track and field, field hockey and other indoor sports that can make use of its artificial turf. Several Olympic speed-skating records are expected to be set on its windless, super-smooth ice surface.

The Olympic Saddledome is already an accepted feature of Calgary's skyline. With a sprawling saddle-shaped concrete roof, it was rushed to completion three years ago for the Calgary Flames hockey team. But the Olympics were the real catalyst for the \$97.3 million in funding from three levels of government. For figure skating and ice

Alberta's chinooks

T MIDNIGHT on January 27, 1962, the temperature was -19° at Pincher Creek, Alta. Within an hour, it jumped 22° as the winds swung around to the west-southwest gusting to 95 kilometres an hour. The snowcover disappeared like magic. While spectacular, the weather change was not unusual. Residents knew a chinook was underway and that the weather might continue spring-like for days or revert just as suddenly to its previous wintry cold.

Chinook is an Indian word meaning "snow eater". It refers to a class of strong winds called foehn (föhn) that become warm and dry in descending a mountain slope. In other mountainous regions the foehn (the name originated in the Alps) has a variety of names: zonda in Argentina, koembang in Java and puelche in


Chinooks occur often over the western plains of North America but are at their greatest strength in southwestern Alberta where they funnel through Crowsnest Pass and fan out across southern Alberta with diminishing effect as they cross into Saskatchewan. At Crowsnest, chinooks occur an average of 30 days per winter, 25 in Calgary, 20 at Medicine Hat and only 10 at Swift Current. Edmonton is not prime chinook country.


Signalling the arrival of a chinook wind is the typical arch of low cloud in the western sky parallelling the Rockies. The wind always blows from the southwest or west and is strong (40 to 80 km/h) and gusty (up to 160 km/h) enough to lift roofs, snap power lines, shatter windows and even topple pedestrians. Rapid temperature rises and falls are classic and the air is as dry as desert air.

When westerly winds carry warm, moist air from the Pacific, they first reach the Coast Mountains and glide up and over the western slopes. At higher elevations the air expands and cools, about 1°C for every 200 metres of rise. In the ascent the moisture in the air condenses and falls as rain or snow, and in the process great quantities of stored heat are released into the atmosphere. The process repeats with each successive interior mountain chain traversed and with each ascent more moisture is "wrung" from the east-travelling air stream. Once over the final mountain barrier (the Rockies), dry air plunges to the plains, warming again by compression (like air warmed inside a bicycle pump) at a rate twice the cooling rate of the ascent. Compression of the air coming into Alberta raises the temperature eight to 10 degrees above that of the Pacific air at the same elevation on the west side of the Coast Mountains.

To southern Albertans, a chinook is a mixed blessing. While to most it may bring a welcome touch of spring and temporary relief from the bitter cold of winter, a few are bothered by debilitating reactions ranging from sleeplessness to severe migraines. Other drawbacks are decreased soil moisture, wind-blown topsoil and disrupted skiing conditions. Positive aspects include natural snow removal and the exposure of forage for cattle and wildlife, not to mention golf in January and lilac blooms in February.

hockey, the Saddledome's rink will be expanded to international size and 2,300 seats added for a total capacity of about 19,300.


The biggest surprise for visitors and almost 400,000 people have toured it to date — will be Canada Olympic Park located just off the Trans-Canada Highway on Calgary's western outskirts. Site of the ski jumping, bobsled and luge events, as well as freestyle skiing demonstrations, the park is cut from the northeast-facing bank of the Bow River, which itself cuts into a plateau 200 metres higher than downtown Calgary's 1,050-metre elevation. First developed in 1961 as Paskapoo, a be-

ginners' ski slope, it pioneered snow making in the area. Today the 70- and 90-metre concrete ski-jump towers, dominant and instant landmarks, stand starkly above Calgary Olympic Park's still-gentle slopes that the ski runs share with the refrigerated luge and bobsled course.

Although the ski jumps face northeast to minimize the melting effect of direct sunlight, the gusting chinooks caused two problems during tests last winter: they dissipated the snow from the ramps, and they tended to blow jumpers off course. The solution for the snow was simply to truck more in from the mountains 100 kilometres west in Kananaskis Country. As for the winds, organizers rejected a proposal to build a windbreak, opting instead to gamble on statistics showing that wind conditions would permit jumping from both 90- and 70-metre towers during 67 percent and 88 percent of daylight hours respectively during the 16-day Games. Construction of the jumps involved a major earth-moving project. To min-

imize what would have presented an ugly intrusion on the treeless skyline, their height was lowered by excavating a giant landing bowl, creating in the process a huge amphitheatre for 50,000 spectators. (Designing the bowl re-





quired some trial and error: on an early test jump, Canadian Horst Bulau proved that the outrun was too short when he overshot the counterslope and flew completely out of the bowl.) Soil and sandstone removed from the skijump bowl were hauled up to the top of the neighbouring ski run, adding 15 metres of vertical drop to it.

The weather causes less concern at the sun-shaded luge and bobsled track. Both events are run on the same icy course, with luge, in which racers lie face up on a sled, starting lower on the track than bobsled competitors. The latter reach speeds of up to 150 kilometres an hour. The \$18.6-million

track includes a giant refrigeration plant that pumps coolant through 80 kilometres of pipe embedded in almost 2,000 metres of zig-zagging ice-encased cement. The plant can produce 1,250 tonnes of ice a day (six times the icemaking capability of the Olympic Saddledome).

But best-laid plans can still go awry. Last winter's record warm spell caused dust from surrounding snow-free hills to sully the ice surface. A complete deicing was required. Despite this, no events were cancelled and about 20,000 training runs were made before season's end. Part of the Olympic budget includes a \$30-million trust fund which



will be used after the Games to operate Canada Olympic Park as a sports training centre and a tourist stop.

The two remaining venues for Calgary's Winter Olympics are on the eastern slopes of the Rocky Mountains about 100 kilometres west of the city. At the Canmore Nordic Centre, crosscountry skiing, the biathlon (in which skiers with rifles race along a crosscountry course, stopping to shoot at targets along the way) and the crosscountry portion of the nordic combined (ski jumping is the other portion) will be held. The \$14.4-million centre, built by the provincial government, is situated on a forested bench above the town of Canmore just east of Banff Nation-



al Park. With an elevation of 1,420 metres and sheltered from the wind by Mount Rundle's east wall, the Canmore site is considered chinook proof; nevertheless, snow-making cannons have been installed to cover 10 of the 58 kilometres of groomed trails that loop out through a pine forest from the centre's lodge. They are undulating, demanding trails with intimidating pitches, considered "very tough" by international standards. The site, along with other major Olympic facilities, was tested last winter with a World Cup event and, according to top competitors, passed with flying colours. It is ideal for spectators too. Because of its compact, looping layout and system of trail overpasses, racing action can be viewed clearly from a variety of prospects. Again, it offers a considerable post-Olympic legacy: night skiing on a 2.5-kilometre trail and easy adaptability in summer for hikers and mountain bikers.

he still-controversial site of the downhill ski events remains most vulnerable to the weather. Nakiska, at Mount Allan, was not included in Cal-




gary's bid to the International Olympic Organizing Committee in 1981. The original choice, the Mount Sparrowhawk-Tent Ridge area near Canmore, was subsequently rejected because the slopes were considered dangerously steep and road-building costs would have been excessive. When Mount Allan was proposed, a storm of protest ensued. "Two on a scale of 10" was the initial assessment of former Olympic skier Ken Read. Cited were problems ranging from low snowfall, high winds and poor slopes to disturbance of the winter range of bighorn sheep herds. The provincial government, which had agreed to pay for an Olympic mountain, had already invested \$30 million in roads and tourism to promote Mount Allan as the jewel of its \$506-million development of Kananaskis Country.


The government won the day. Mount Allan was selected and \$25.3 million spent to create an Olympicstandard ski run from the mountain's 256-metre vertical drop. Workers moved tonnes of earth to modify the slopes, installed a \$5-million snowmaking system to cover almost all the competition runs, and built lifts (including an extra \$3.9-million quadruple chairlift demanded by the International Organizing Committee to carry 2,500 spectators an hour to the slalom courses halfway up the mountain).

Nakiska - meaning "meeting place" in Cree — was put to the test last year when nature provided the warmest winter of the century. Throughout the season, Mount Allan's snow cover was substantially less than neighbouring ski areas, including Mount Sparrowhawk. To make matters worse, problems developed with the snowmaking equipment, and ice and wind made the top pitch of the men's downhill run dangerous. In the face of a rising chorus of "I-told-you-sos", and with the help of hundreds of snowshovelling volunteers and some very timely cold snaps, only one of eight preview events (prerequisites to running Olympic races at the site) was cancelled — ironically, because the snow-making system put too much snow on part of the course.

The ski slope eventually satisfied Read and competitors at the World Cup. "It's a test worthy of the OlymAbove: on the sundeck of the lodge at Nakiska, Mount Allan's ski resort. The controversial mountain had less snow last year than neighbouring ski areas.

pics — a gutwrencher closer to Withhel than the ease of Sarajevo," In the former Olympian. Swiss World Cup ace Peter Mueller declared that, with good snow conditions, Nakiska ranks with the greatest courses in the world. And just to prove that "good snow conditions" could occur naturally, there was a major snowfall just after the last scheduled race!


The bold optimism of Nakiska's proponents notwithstanding, Mount Allan's weather record is not encouraging: it has had almost no snow in February for the past 16 consecutive years.

The weather remains the imponderable. On a final pre-Games visit to Calgary in September, International Ski Federation president Marc Hodler surprised officials by telling them the best way to organize a Winter Olympics is without snow. "It's easier to put snow on the ski slopes than it is to have a lot of snow and have to take it off highways, parking lots, roads and streets."

Climatologists at Future Weather Inc., of Lakefield, Ont., sent predictions in September. Their forecast: a jet-stream blockage now forming over Siberia will pump cold air and aboveaverage snowfalls into Western Canada from October to December. Balmy weather should follow for the Games in February. Olympic Organizing Committee chairman Frank King welcomed the prediction: "If you had asked me to write the ideal forecast, it couldn't have been better than that. That is precisely what we want: a lot of cold well before the Games so you can make all the snow you want. We don't want to make snow during the Games."

Still, many Calgarians will look beyond formal weather projections and tie their hopes to a more traditional prognosis: the 1988 Farmer's Almanac predicts cold weather, snow and just enough chinooks to keep everyone comfortable.


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CITY OF CALGARY, Planning & Building Department Base Map (1983)

WHEREAS Sarcee Indian Reserve No. 145, in the Province of Alberta is an Indian Reserve, having been set apart for the use and benefit of the Sarcee Eand of Indians;

WHEREAS the Surrender Document attached as Annex "A" describes a surrender of lands on Sarcee Indian Reserve No. 145 for use by the Department of National Defence in accordance with the terms and conditions contained substantially in the form of an undated Agreement, which Agreement is known as the Sarcee Training Area Settlement Agreement and which Agreement is annexed to, and forms part of the Surrender Document:

WHEREAS the referendum was duly authorized by the Minister of Indian Affairs and Northern Development to consider and vote on the surrender and the ratification of the Sarcee Training Area Settlement Agreement;

WHEREAS the referendum was held on the 28th day of March, 1985. Of the 289 eligible electors, 217 voted in the referendum with 191 voting in favour of the surrender and ratification of the Agreement, 24 voting against and 2 ballots being rejected. The surrender may therefore be accepted since it was assented to by a majority of the electors of the Band.

AND WHEREAS the Sarcee Band of Indians, for whose use and benefit the Sarcee Indian Reserve No. 145 was set apart, request that the lands be used by the Department of National Defence in accordance with the terms and conditions contained in the Sarcee Training Area Settlement Agreement, and on further conditions that:

- On expiration of the use of the lands by the Department of National Defence in accordance with the terms and conditions of the Sarcee Training Area Settlement Agreement, all beneficial interest and control of the conditionally surrendered lands shall revert to the Sarcee Band and as though this surrender had never been given, consented to and approved;
- That this surrender is granted solely for the purpose of allowing Her Majesty in right of Canada to permit the use of the conditionally surrendered lands by the Department of National Defence in accordance with the terms and conditions contained in the said Sarcee Training Area Settlement Agreement;
- 3. That all proceeds are to be held by Her Majesty in right of Canada, or Her authorized representative, for the use and benefit of the Sarcee Band;
- 4. That all documents issued upon acceptance of the surrender will be approved by the Band Council before execution on behalf of the Minister.

THEREFORE, HER EXCELLLENCY THE GOVERNOR GENERAL IN COUNCIL, on the recommendation of the Minister of Indian Affairs and Northern Development hereby accepts, pursuant to section 40 of the Indian Act, the surrender of that part of Sarcee Indian Reserve No. 145 described in the Document of Surrender for use by the Department of National Defence in accordance with the terms and conditions contained in the said Document of Surrender dated March 28th, 1985, attached as Annex "A" hereto.



If you read through the enclosed correspondence of 1926 and 1927 of the Geographic Board of Canada dealing with Cochrane, you will probably come to the conclusion that it was named after T.B.H. Cochrane son of Admiral Sir Thos. Cochrane not after Senator M.H. Cochrane.

We are under the impression that J.M. Wallace's letters of June 22 and July 18, 1927 came to R. Douglas at the time when the manuscript of Place Names of Alberta was already at the printing stage. This is probably why the appropriate correction did not appear in the final text.



City's growth buried Harlem

The name of Calgary is not a translation from the Gaelic "clear running water" but from "bay farm" on the Scottish Isle of Mull, site of a small castle called Calgary House, in Gaelic "Cala-ghearridh".

The Scottish roots of many pioneers who helped shaped Calgary are found in St. Andrews Heights, named for a golf course that once occupied that hill, Scotland Street in Scarboro and, of course, the Macleod Trail commemorating our founder Colonel James Macleod of the North West Mounted Police.

The 20th century was just settling into place when Calgary's city fathers decided upon the numbered grid pattern divided into quadrants with avenues running east and west, streets north and south. Except for a few contoured roadways it was possible immediately to pinpoint a location by its street or avenue number with its house number indicating the side of the road upon which it was situated.

A 1912 map meticulously prepared by Messrs. Harrison, Ponton and Parker of the Department of Agriculture set out the district names then affixed to occupied areas and thousands of surveyed acres reaching far out into the empty prairie. One of the early ones was Forest Lawn without a trace of a forest and probably very few tenderly nurtured patches of cultivated grass. Among other areas whose original names have survived are Richmond, Killarney, Glengarry. Belfast, Mount Royal, Windsor Park and Kelvin Grove.

Perhaps it is unfair to tell residents of University Heights and the U of C campus that they really live in the Bronx for it was called that in 1912. North of it was the Golden Bronx while in the northeast where Charleswood sits today was Berkeley, Rosemount Park and Trinity Estate.

Looking backward

Perhaps more recent land speculators should be forgiven for having erased Happyland from the map in a small area to the west of the Crowchild Bridge's north end.

Maharg was another merciful demise. Spelled backwards it was Graham, the name of a land developer of the early 1900s who tried in vain to establish a high class residential subdivision not far from the southeastern area we know as Tempo Village.

Today's creators of new residential districts on the otherwise wilderness outskirts appear to pay little heed to those who laid out the land early in the century and who, indeed, sold much of it piece by piece to unsuspecting absentee buyers. That is why some established but unused northeast Calgary names: Manitou, Park, Avondale, Highgate, Balaclava, Chesterfield, Warwick Place, Birmingham and Wordendale have vanished, to be replaced by Pineridge, Whitehorn, Temple and Marlborough, all equally pallid of significance.

One cannot help but-wonder why there is such a proliferation of "ridges" of which Calgary has so few, for now we have Pineridge, Oakridge, Maple Ridge and the geographically logical one, Lynwood Ridge.

One district crossed the Bow River! Varsity Heights originally was to the west of town close by what we call Broadcast Hill, for it was there that early boosters hoped the University of Alberta would be built. When Edmmonton became the provincial capital and the university site, the name faded, only to be revitalized when the Calgary campus was established.


An interesting old district is Mission, south of the downtown core and the site, in 1875, of a Roman Catholic mission just about where the Holy Cross Hospital nurses' residence stands today.

By 1883 the Oblate Fathers had acquired most of the land bounded by what we know as 2nd Street S.E. Recent



and 4th Street S.W. and 17th avenue on the north to 34th Avenue in the south.

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Part of that prairie land became known as Rouleauville because of the Rouleau brothers, Charles who was Chief Justice of the Northwest Territories and Hector, surgeon to the local mounted police detachment.

They lived in an imposing sandstone residence the corner of the newly surveyed thoroughfares, Broadway and St. Mary. We know the location as 4th Street and 19th Avenue S.W. The area's avenues were given such names as St. Joseph, Oblate, Lacombe, Doucet, Grandin, Scollen and 17th Avenue was named Notre Dame. The names were replaced when Mission, Roxboro and Rideau were brought within the newly expanded city boundaries in 1907.

The railways in the century's early years gave us Grand Trunk, a small area to the west of Hillhurst, Great Northern and Great Northern Addition where Currie Barracks stands today, Cepeear, for an obvious reason, marked a knot of houses just south of the railway's Ogden

Shops and Canadian Northern was a grid of streets far beyond the modest limits of the city where Mayland Heights now stands.

As the city continues its explosive spread I wonder if someone will re-introduce one district name that has been missing from our street maps for nearly 70 years? We know it as Foothills Estates and Charleswood Heights. Old timers pointed it out on their maps as Harlem!



Our department is conducting an archival search to determine whether archaeological sites discovered years ago may still remain intact in the city of Calgary. In this connection, we have an interest in the name of a local hill, which might relate to an archaeological site.

Cairn Hill is located in west Calgary, at 51° Ol' N. Lat., 114° 10° W. Long. It is considerably higher than the residential area on the old glacial lake plain to the east, but cannot be described as an imposing hill. I rather doubt that it acquired its name through any fancied resemblance to a cairn.

Indians in this area of the plains devoted a great deal of time to the construction of rock cairns, usually on or near hilltops. Among these are the more elaborate structures we call medicine wheels. Several of the major known cairns are on sufficiently high hills that they have served, as triangulation points for surveys.

On this basis I suspect that there may once have been a cairn on Gairn Hill. It may still remain, obscured by overgrowth or by a layer of soil. Do you have any record of how the hill received its name? The few gazeteers I have been able to find have shed no light on the subject, but perhaps the origin lies in a surveyor's report or other document in your possession.

I would be grateful for any information, however fragmentary, that you may be able to share regarding this matter. Thank you very much for your attention and assistance.

SUBJECT

Since last fall we have been in contact with the Alberta CPCGN member to sort out the situation concerning sub-division names within the Calgary urban area.

As you will see from the attached copy of Mr. Montagano's memo to Alan Rayburn (January 12, 1979) the current branch policy is to show as many authorized sub-division names as possible on the 1:25,000 and 1:50,000 NTS maps. Rescheduling of production gave us until the end of February to supply the best nomenclature to Topographical Survey. 82 I/13 and 82 J/16 have already been cleared through to the teams (cycle 9), therefore this urban information is required in the immediate future. 82 I/13 has only one name to be added; this could satisfactorily be sent as supplementary information. 82 J/16 has 33 additional names; either recompilation of the present urban area or of the NE quarter of the sheet would seem appropriate. 82 O/1 and 82 P/4 are currently on the priority list.

The Alberta Historic Sites Board responsible for geographical name decisions in Alberta, does not consider it has the jurisdiction to put through official approvals for city neighbourhood and subdivision names. Staff have, however, worked with the City of Calgary Planning Commission to produce an accurate representation of sub-division names, for these four Calgary sheets.

A copy of John Lunn's letter to Alan Rayburn (Feb. 5, 1979) is attached to clarify some of the points made. You will see that in some cases exact boundaries have never been clearly defined; in other instances the extent of the urban area has obviously outgrown the limits shown on the latest 1:50,000. On the attached maps the names have been written to reflect the desired location of type. Please notice that upper case lettering split between several lines may in future produce ambiguity in spelling, and that questions will have to be clarified by reference to the accompanying typed list. This positioning of names should be followed in compilation of names manuscripts.

The Alberta Historic Sites Board has endorsed these names for mapping purposes; it will not be issuing official decision lists. The subdivision names should, therefore, be entered on our amendment maps, ap-

propriately keyed to Dr. Lunn's letter and list of Feb. 5, 1979, a copy of which we will put on each of the four files in question. Unless we are notified to the contrary from Alberta, these names should not be included for gazetteer or supplement purposes, and the cards should simply contain the following type of information.

Re: Calgary Subdivision Names - 82 1/13, 82 J/16, 82 0/1, 82 P/4

In response to your request regarding Calgary Subdivisions, our staff have met with the Chief Draftsman and the Senior Subdivision Officer, Land Use Department, of the City of Calgary Planning Department to discuss the discrepancies in spelling and application of the names which appear on the City of Calgary Planning, the M.C.E. and the 1:25,000 scale NTS maps.

Both neighborhood and subdivision names appear on the City of Calgary Planning map and in some cases these overlap. Too, in some cases, names are applied adjacent to the subdivision so that street names are not obscured. Boundaries of some of the older neighborhoods/subdivisions have never been clearly defined, especially in the downtown section.

We checked all of the maps with the City of Calgary Planning Department and although definite boundaries are not outlined, the names apply as shown on the enclosed NTS Map Sheets.

CEEPEEAR is not a subdivision. It is a name used by the City of Calgary for a reference point in the C.P.R. yards. City Planning officials felt that it should not appear on NTS maps

The City of Calgary Planning Commission has agreed to send us all City Council decisions on subdivision names as they are approved. We will forward these to you as we receive them.



Attached is a list of urban community names for $82\ 0/1$ as they are portrayed on the Calgary Planning Map, the 1:25,000 maps and the military city map.

Names shown in black pencil reflect application on the planning map, those in blue show variations on the 1:25,000 maps and those in Green, differences on the military city map.

Bill Yeo said the placement of names in the Inglewood section were quite inaccurate. He said Pearce Estate applied only to the park east of the CP tracks, and that Inglewood was the whole area shown on the attached map as Pearce Estate and Inglewood. He also said that both Grandview and Mills Estate were really known as Ramsay.

The name *Eau Claire* has occurred in some references I have seen. To what part of Calgary does it apply? Is it still in current use?

You may think that all the names will clutter the map. Be assured that the cartographers will select type that will identify the urban community names in Calgary in a pleasing way.

I have been assured, however, that a large number of new names will be given serious consideration for this map before it goes to press. At one time the cartographers selected the urban community names from sources available to them, resulting in many discrepancies. It was decided by the CPCGN in 1971 that the respective provincial members should advise on the correct names of urban communities to be shown on topographical maps. Without the recommendations of the Alberta member on these names none could be shown on the maps.

It would be appreciated if you could have the extent of the areas of each name you wish to have shown on 82 O/l clearly outlined on 82 O/l or the Calgary Planning Map.







"Mr. Perry, on behalf of the Nose Creek Historical Society, explained that the Society is working to have Nose Creek properly named. He stated that the creek which is now called the Beddington Creek, which skirts Nose Hill, was named Nose Creek in 1884. In about 1910, someone called it Beddington Creek and the Society feels that this creek has lost its historical significance. There is a small creek which flows to Beddington, which is nameless, which would more properly be called Beddington Creek.

Moved that Council support the Nose Creek Historical Society in its effort to have both branches of Nose Creek correctly named, and the creek which flows to Beddington named Beddington Creek."

REFERENCES

Following are comments of those persons consulted regarding this matter:

W. H. BOGDAN, Manager Mapping, Alberta Transportation states "prior to approximately 1905, our records indicate that both major branches of Nose Creek were labelled as such, "NOSE CREEK", no distinction being made by surveyors at that time. See attached copies of field book #3837 and township plan 25-1-W5 by S. C. Brabazon dated 1884 (Township map approved 1885).

Sectional map #164 dated April 18, 1910 shows the north-westerly branch as BEDDINGTON CREEK as do all subsequent maps. New editions of township plans for this area were produced in 1919 and all show BEDDINGTON CREEK for the north westerly branch and NOSE CREEK for the northerly branch."

He concurred with the suggestion that the northerly branch to the Bow River be Nose Creek (as approved in the Gazetteer) and the north westerly branch be WEST NOSE CREEK not BEDDINGTON CREEK. He also recommended that the name BEDDINGTON CREEK be approved for the small creek which flows into NOSE CREEK at 23-25-1-W5M, 51 08 30" 114 02 30".

ROY THOMPSON, Supervisor of Resource Mapping, Technical Division, Alberta Energy and Natural Resources, supplied early township maps and his records agreed with Mr. Bogdan's regarding ambiguity in application of the name NOSE CREEK. He recommended that the name BEDDINGTON CREEK should apply to the small creek which flows south east into NOSE CREEK at 51 08 30" 114 02 30", 23-25-1-W5M and that the name of the north westerly branch of Nose Creek, now officially BEDDINGTON CREEK, should be changed to WEST NOSE CREEK.

MR. T. R. HOWDEN, President, and MR. C. REDVERS PERRY, Honarary member and Past President of the Nose Creek Historical Society were agreed that they would be very pleased should the Board recommend official approval of a change of the name Beddington Creek to WEST NOSE CREEK and the approval of the name BEDDINGTON CREEK for the small creek flowing south east into Nose Creek at 23-25-1-W5M, 51 08'30" 114 02'30".

MRS. GEORGEEN BARRAS, Provincial Secretary, Historical Society of Alberta agreed with the suggested name change and expressed pleasure that the issue was being resolved.

Correct Placing of Nose Creek and Beddington Creek Names

To Whom It May Concern:

In 1885 S. L. Brabazon, Dominion Surveyor, sent in his official report to the Honorable Minister of the Interior, Ottawa, after surveying Township 25, Range 1, West of the 5th, wherein he stated:
"An abundant supply of excellent water may be had from Nose Creek the two branches of which join in section 14, forming a Y in the township."

Also in the same township there was and is another small slough-fed creek running into the eastern branch of Nose Creek but this often scanty creek was not named until the siding of Beddington was developed in 1891. From then on all concerned, mainly those living in the township, referred to the creeks as Nose Creek (on the west and northesst) and Beddington running into it. This state of affairs lasted until April 18th, 1910 when due to an appare not error or indifference, a map was put out calling the western branch of the creek 'Bedding on'. A letter to Redvers Perry of Balzac, of the Nose Creek Historical Society from E. J. Holmgren, Secretary of the Geographical Board of Alberta, dated April 11th, 1972, confuses the issue further when in paragraph three he referes to the northwestern branch as Beddington and in paragraph five he calls the northwesterly branch Beddington.

Over the years from 1910 to 1972, and since that time, various people, and the Nose Creek Historical Society in particular, have been trying to get the two names correctly applied as they were first designated in 1885 and 1891 despite the reply in the official comment from the Geographical Board of Alberta, October 19th, 1973, stating, "... when a name has gained public acceptance it should not be changed."

The Nose Creek Historical Society contend that they represent the public and the public has not accepted the change made through careless error. The public living in the township are very concerned that the names of the creeks be put in their proper places as they were known prior to 1910.

Enclosed is a petition from these interested people and many others who through work in the many local histories being written today, the impending development of the area (which will need new names) and the movement of the city northward, also the rightness of the matter, hope the issue can be reopened and the future maps printed with the first given names in the first allotted places. (Reference: Canadian Permanent Committee on Geographical Names, Principles and Procedures, Page 3, Guiding Principles, paragraph 3: Names in Public Use: First consideration should be given to names with well-established public use.) As the letter from the Geographical Board said in April, 1972, "...it would probably be a slight problem here..." to change the names on the maps.


This matter is important to us in Township 25, and neighbouring townships, comprising original homesteaders, their descendants, other farmers and rahchers, acreage dwellers, land developers, and people of all walks of life elsewhere as exhibited by the signatures on the enclosed petition, to have the northwesterly and northeasterly branches of the creek called the Nose Creek which forms a Y and runs for many miles, and the slough-fed run-off running into it called Beddington Creek.

We respectfully submit this for your serious and immediate consideration.

Thank you for your letter of November 20th concerning the above. I must apologize for not having written sooner about this matter but with the continued research and the Board has since met and has ruled on the name Beddington Creek.

It was after considerable discussion by the Board, taking into account all historical and other associations it was agreed that the name Beddington Creek is a name that has gained public acceptance and has been known for some 70 years as such and the name should not be changed; in other words it should remain as Beddington Creek and this would elimiate the use of names as West Branch Nose Creek, North Branch Nose Creek and so on, as these are in conflict with our principles of nomenclature. The names Writing Creek and Nose Creek could be left as they are.

.

I have already communicated with the Historical Society Executive concerning this matter but have so far not heard anything from them yet; probably we will before long and there will be quite a strong reaction. None-theless it was the express wish of the Board that the name not be changed. I might add that it is not uncommon as you are probably aware of creeks having tributaries referred to as the West Branch or the North Branch, South or East Branch of the main creek even though the tributary might have a name; this might often happen when the person discribing the area is not aware of the name of the tributary.



This is to advise you that the Municipal District of Rocky View No. 44 has been in receipt of a letter from the Historical Society of Alberta with respect to the proper naming of the West branch of the Nose Creek.

The Municipal District Council, at its meeting on January 23, 1973, moved a resolution indicating the West branch of the Nose Creek should be properly named.

Pursuant to this resolution of Council, action has been taken that all Municipal District maps be corrected to indicate proper name and your co-operation is respectfully requested for renaming your maps insofar as this Municipal District is concerned. The Creek under discussion is one that parallels Simon's Valley road and should be named West branch of the Nose Creek, with the North branch of Nose Creek following the C.P.R. mainline railway northwards toward Edmonton. The true Beddington Creek is one that has its headwaters in the S.E.½ 5-26-1-5, and goes in a south-easterly direction entering the North branch of the Nose Creek approximately in the vacinity of the Beddington station.

In addition, the Creek from the Nier station located in Twp. 28, Rge. 2, West of the Fifth meridian, preceding easterly to intersection with Nose Creek south of Crossfield is called Writing Creek. This name is given on the basis of cryptography located on rocks next to the buffalo jump in Twp. 28-2-5. To this day, archeologists have been unable to decipher this writing.

- (9) The Regional Supervisor shall take every precaution to prevent over-payment of allowance by immediately advising the District Training Board and the V.A. Treasury Officer of any changes in the Terms of the Engagement.
- 6. Short courses will normally be taken after the veteran is established. However, if a veteran has been issued an unconditional certification of qualification, and if it is impossible for him to obtain possession of the property immediately, he may be permitted to take a short course prior to establishment. In such cases training allowance shall be paid directly to the veteran.

Post-establishment Training

- 7. (1) Established veterans should be encouraged to take Agricultural Short Courses, and District Superintendents shall make arrangements with appropriate authorities to provide suitable courses as the need arises.
- (2) If an established veteran wishes to obtain an allowance while taking a short course, he must make application on DVA Form W.D. 13 within one year after date of establishment. (Section 17 of V.R. Act).
- (3) On receipt of Form W.D. 13, the Regional Supervisor shall forward the application together with his recommendations to the appropriate District Training Board and also send a copy to District Office for information. It is imperative that applications be registered with the Training Board before the expiration of time limit for application.
- (4) The District Training Board shall advise the Regional Supervisor of its decision at the same time as the veteran is informed.
- (5) Subsequent to approval, the veteran will be expected to attend the first available course suitable to his needs, and only in exceptional circumstances shall deferment be granted. If the veteran requests that his training be deferred, the Regional Supervisor shall investigate the reasons and submit his recommendation to the Training Board, a copy of which shall be sent to the District Office. If the recommended deferment is not approved by the Training Board, full particulars may be submitted to Head Office where the matter will be settled by discussion with the Director of Training.
- (6) Training Allowances shall be paid directly to the veteran as is customary for other vocational training.
- (7) Wives of veterans should be encouraged to take suitable short courses and, if veterans and still eligible, they may make application for training allowance.
- (8) During the early years of establishment, veterans should be urged to take advantage of all suitable short courses, even though allowances are not available. District and Regional officials should constantly review the training needs and assist in arranging desirable courses.

Commercial Fishing

8. The principles and procedure outlined in this chapter apply with respect to veterans established as commercial fishermen (Section 17 of V.R. Act).

RULES

To be observed in submitting names to the Geographic Board

Names submitted to the Geographic Board should be accompanied by a map showing the position of the features for which the names

If the features already bear names which appear on any published map, a reference to this map suffices.

Names received by the Board for consideration are referred to the member of the Board representing the Province concerned, after which they go to the Executive Committee of the Board. It is desirable, therefore, that lists and maps should be submitted in duplicate, where this can be done conveniently.

The memorandum submitted should state whether the suggested names are new, or have been published, and whether the features they

The memorinal submitted should state whether the suggested names are new, or have been published, and whether the tending shelp apply to are unamed, or possessames. If a suggested name is new, full particulars respecting the origin must be given. If a suggested name has already been published, the date of publication as well as the circumstances of the origin, if known, should be given.

If a proposed name is intended to replace a published or existing one, this name should be given, with the place and date of publication, if known, as well as the arguments for the proposed change.

Blank forms for lists of names are furnished by the Secretary on application.

The rules adopted by the Board for dealing with names are as follows:-

- 1. Local use to have preference.—Unless good and sufficient reasons to the contrary exist, that name which is in common local use
- shall be given preference over alternative names.

 2. Priority to be recognized.—When the priority of a name has been established by publication, particularly when such publication has occurred in any standard or authoritative work or works, that name should, if possible, be retained.

 3. Names corrupted or changed.—A name which has been corrupted or changed.should, if not too firmly established by usage be
- restored to its original form.

 4. Various spellings. When to be accepted.—In cases where what was originally the same word appears with various spellings, sanctioned by local usage or otherwise, the various spellings when applied to different features should be regarded as in effect different names and as a rule it is inadvisable to attempt to produce uniformity.

 5. Choice between two or more names.—Where a choice is offered between two or more names for the same place or feature, all sanc-

5. Othere between two or more names.—where a choice is offered between two or more names for the same place of reache, an sale-tioned by local usage, that which is most appropriate and euphonious should be adopted.

6. English possessive form.—In English nomenclature, the possessive form should be avoided whenever it can be done without destroying the euphony of the name or changing its descriptive application. Where the possessive form is retained, the apostrophe should be dropped.

7. Names consisting of several words.—Names consisting of more than one word may be connected by hyphens or combined in one-

S. City, town or ville as part of names. - The use of the words 'city, "'town," or "ville," as part of the name of a city, town or

village, is to be avoided.

- 9. Capyon, Caïon or Gorge.—"Canyon" may be used instead of "cañon," but the form "canon" without the tilda sign must not be used. The word "gorge," which has the advantage of being both English and French, may often be substituted.

 10. Creek and Brook.—The term" brook" is considered preferable to "creek" for very small streams.

 11. Branches of rivers.—The practice of naming branches of rivers "Soutek" in "North branch," "East fork," etc., is objection able. Each branch should be given an individual name, and when practicable, the name of the main stream should be continued to the
- 12. Duplication of names.—Duplication of names, especially within one province, is objectionable. This excludes such common descriptive names as Bear, Deer, Duck, Eagle, Fish, Maple, Moose, Pigeon, Pine, Sturgeon, Trout, Turtle, Wolf, Wood, Black, Clear, Green, Red, White, Mud, etc. Duplication also renders undesirable a number of descriptive names which are less common, such as many of the names applied to mountain peaks.

13. Alternative names.—The use of alternative names should be discontinued where possible or not inconvenient.

- 14. Initial letters. When not to be capitals.—Except on maps, the initial letters of generic or descriptive parts of geographical names,
- 15. French names in Canada.—French names in Canada are to be spelled, accented, hyphenated, etc., according to the rules of the French language. In English text and map printing, however, hyphenation although recommended for French composite names, shall not be considered obligatory.
- 16. English and French forms of a name.—In cases where English and French forms of a single name have been published and have the sanction of long usage, no attempt shall be be made to abolish either form, but both may be recognized and published in the Board's list of decisions, and it shall be deemed correct to use the English form in official documents in the English language and the French form in official documents in the French language. In all other cases, any duplication of form shall be discouraged and preference shall be given to the form which has priority of origin whether this be English or French.

 17. Descriptive terms—when to be translated.—A generic descriptive term, such as cape, bay, river, etc., added to a name, may be translated for use in French for use in French publications. Likewise, the corresponding French term may be translated into English for use in English publications, but when such term is part of the name as in "Murray Bay," "and Deux-Rivières," it shall not be translated.

 18. Objectionable Combination of words.—As a general rule, the combination of words in different languages is objectionable.

 19. Names in Toreign Countries.—Geographic names in a foreign country should be rendered in the form adopted by that country, except where there are English or French equivalents already fixed by usage, in which case the English equivalents are to be used in English publications, and the French equivalents in French publications.

 20. Hyphens in Indian names.—Hyphens between syllables of Indian names are to be avoided.

 21. Names of native origin.—In a name of native origin the true sound of the word, as pronounced in the native tongue shall be taken as the basis of the spelling. 16. English and French forms of a name.—In cases where English and French forms of a single name have been published and have


21. Raines of many organ.—In a name of native origin the true sound of the word, as personanced in the native tongue shall be taken as the basis of the Royal Geographical Society.—For spelling names of native origin, the rules of the Royal Geographical Society, which are substantially in accord with official practice in France, shall be adhered to. 

ARTICLE FOR MATURAL RESOURCES.

Ranching days in Alberta are recalled by such place-names as Cochrane, DeWinton, Mitford, Staveley and Stinson. According to a forthcoming publication of the Geographic Board of Canada on the "Romance of Alberta Place-names" will explain that Cochrane village, which dates from 1884, does not commemorate Senator M.H. Cochrane (1823-1903) President of the British America Ranch Co., which received a lease of 100,000 acres in 1882, but Lt. Thos. Belhaven Henry Cochrane R.N., a son of Admiral Sir Thos. Cochrane, who received a lease of 55,000 acres in 1884. Lt. Cochrane married in 1887 Lady Adela Rous, daughter of the Earl of Stradbrol Ledy Adela was for a time postmistress of Mitford village, which was so named in 1889 after a great friend of hers Mrs. Percy Mitford, sister of the first earl of Egerton.

The town of Staveley is named after Alex. Staveley Hill, an English member of Parliament, who organised the Oxley ranch in 1862 and who related his ranching experiences in "From Home to H published in 1885. The village of DeWinton is named after Gener DeWinton, secretary to the Marquis of Lorne, governor general who organised the De Winton Ranch Co. and Stimson creek Major Fred Stimson for many years resident manager of Bar-U ranch (North West Cattle Co.)

Yours of the 2nd instant re-the naming of the Cochrane Station west of Calgary is at hand. My file regarding the naming of the C.P.R. Stations has temporarily been loaned, but I have no doubt whatever that it was named after the late Senator M. H. Cochrane, President of the British American Ranch Company. The Lieutenant T. B. H. Cochrane was never very extensively interested in ranching. He had a cousin William Cochrane generally known as "Mosquito Creek" Billy Cochrane, who was for some years engaged in ranching. Billy Cochrane's ranch was located upwards of fifty miles south of Calgary being located on Mosquito Creek five or six miles to the west of Nanton Station.

The Headquarters of the British American Ranch Company was located in Section 10, Township 26, Range 4, West of the 5th, about two miles to the west from where Cochrane station is now located. The Headquarters of that ranch was located in I think 1881 certainly not later than early in the year 1882.

If your Board has issued or when it does issue an original list of the names of the railway stations in Canada west of Fort William I would be very glad to be furnished with a copy.

Cochrane, the other that Senator M.H.Cochrane, president of the British America Ranch Co. is the person commemorated. Both had ranch leases or were in the west about 1883-84. The Board proposes to include in a forthcoming list of Alberta place-names with meanings the municipal districts as found in the published list of Alberta Municipalities.

The first name on the 1925 list is Cochrane, which presumably is situated in the neighbourhood of Cochrane P.O. Next comes Flowery Plains. There is no post office Flowery Plains and the location of this district can only be guessed at.

For descriptive purposes it is essential to know approximately the township, range and meridian of the districts. If you could supply this or a map showing their location by name or number or even loan me such a map, you would greatly oblige.

I should also be glad to have a list of any cities, towns, villages or municipalities not included in the 1925 list.

I have yet to ascertain the meanings of the municipal district names, but probably this will present no difficulty.

From an enquiry by Mr. Ketchum I gather that in some forthcoming article about Calgary it will be stated that the city occupies the site of a fort built by Niverville in 1751. There is no proof of this and all the evidence leads to the belief that the fort was built on the North Saskatchewan in the Edmonton direction, as Niverville was looking for furs and the North Saskatchewan was the beaver region.

There is another persistent misstatement about Calgary to the effect that it at one time bore the name Brisebois. I do not think currency should be given to either of the above misstatements.

I enclose a note as to the origin of the name Calgary.

CALGARY SOUTHWEST SHEET

Sheet No. 82 J/16, Calgary Southwest, of the National Topographic series, embraces an area of about 375 square miles, including outlying portions of the city of Calgary. Part of the line of the city limits may be noted south and west of Ogden.

Calgary is the highest city in Canada, being about 3,400 feet above sea level. It was named "Calgarry" for an estate in the island of Mull, Scotland, but the spelling was changed by the Canadian Pacific Railway when the townsite was surveyed in 1884. Previous to this it had been a North West Mounted Police post since 1876. It now has a population of around 80,000 and is an important commercial centre with oil refineries, elevators, flourmills, railway repair shops and other industries.

The region comprises what is called the "foothill country," its The region comprises what is called the "foothill country," its high rolling nature being readily revealed by a study of the contours. From almost any point the serrated white line of the Rocky mountains may be seen.

Famous as early as the 80's as a ranching centre it is still preeminently ranch country, which accounts for the distances between the homes of the settlers or ranchers, as shown by the map.

Grain is grown chiefly for fodder. The ranch of His Royal Highness, the Prince of Wales, lies about 20 miles off the map south of Millarville.

Millarville.

Snow falls being light, range stock graze throughout the year, requiring little winter feeding. The influence of the chinooks is felt here, and at Christmas time it is not unusual to see the people of

Calgary playing golf and tennis.

In the grassy covers and through the light woods the Hungarian pheasants have increased rapidly. These, with prairie chickens, ducks in the numerous sloughs and geese at migrating time, provide good sport in season. In the streams pike are plentiful with mountain trout at times.

This has never been a great furbearing country but covotes, bad-

gers and rabbits are found.

Bluffs of cottonwood, and clumps of willows along the margins of the streams, relieve the landscape. Continuing toward the mountains the country becomes more heavily wooded, spruce, jackpine, aspen

and balsam being found.

The northern boundary of Sarcee Indian Reserve lies over a quarter of a mile north, and the western line about a mile west off the map. This is one of the most picturesque reserves in the West. A number of tree-bordered brooks meander across it. It has several villages and at the Agency there is a church and school. A show, probably unequalled in the world, is put on at the Calgary Stampede at which these Indians appear wearing their war bonnets and beaded trappings with their horses exhibiting samples of the women's skill in saddles and housings.

At Millarville some of the earliest prospecting for oil took place. As marginally noted the famous Turner Valley oilfields are 7 miles off the map to the south. Oil from the wells is piped to the railway for shipment. Natural gas from this field is piped to Calgary and used for heating and other domestic purposes.

The all-red first class road on the east side of the map is a portion of the famous old Calgary-Macleod trail, surveyed by C. A. Bigger

in 1886.


Priddis and Millarville post offices receive mail by automobile over the yellow or secondary thoroughfare.

The Calgary-Macleod branch of the Canadian Pacific Railway, which is the only railway serving the tract, was built in 1892.




CALGARY SOUTHWEST


OTTAWA TOPOGRAPHICAL SURVEY OF CANADA 1930

algary Northwest sheet, No. 82-O/1, of the National Topographic series, issued on the scale of one mile to the inch, embraces an area of about 375 square miles, lying between latitudes 51°00' and 51°15', and Tongitude 114° 00′ and 114° 30′. The city of Calgary, except for a small portion which extends southeasterly off the sheet, lies in the southeast

Calgary has the highest elevation of any city in Canada, being about 3,400 feet above sea level. David Thompson, surveyor explorer, journeying on a trading trip from Rocky Mountain House which lies about 100 miles northwesterly in a direct line, struck into this region in 1800.

The Hudson's Bay Company's trail between Rocky Mountain House

and Bow river at Calgary was the only one worthy of the name in all southern Alberta when the first surveyors went in there to lay out the land. A map of 1881 of the Northwest Territories, as the Prairie Provinces were then called, shows it, and a report of the Department of the Interior of the 80's describes it.

Due to the turbulence of the tribes the southern portion of Alberta

never was a favourite stamping ground for the fur-traders. Old Bow Fort, some fifty miles westerly from the mapped tract, after a checkered existence, was finally burned down by the Blackfoot Indians in 1820 and not again reestablished.

The Hudson's Bay Company found it impossible to get a footing in

the Calgary country until after the North West Mounted Police in 1875 founded "Fort Calgarry" so named by Colonel James Farquharson Macleod.

The modern city of Calgary, at the junction of the Bow and Elbow rivers, is an important commercial and transportation centre of over 65,000 population. Flour mills, elevators, railway repair shops, oil refineries, and other industries are located here. It is also favourably situated in respect to hydro-electric energy, with considerable further power within easy access and possible of development.

Banff, world-famous for its scenery and hot springs, is eighty-two miles west of Calgary on the Canadian Pacific railway and at the beginning of the well-known Banff-Windermere highway through the Banff and Kootenay national parks. Thousands of tourists visit these localities

All roads have been classified into four classes. The first-class. shown in red, comprises main highways such as the one leading northwesterly from Calgary. This is a part of the "Grand Circle Tour" from Los Angeles to Calgary, Banff and Lake Windermere (as above noted). Roads of the second class, shown in orange, connect important towns and serve large districts. Class three roads-in double black lines-are local roads well travelled, while class four roads-in double black dotted lines-are used for wheeled traffic, but may not always be suitable for motor traffic.

Near the eastern limits of the city, in section 13, township 24, range 1, west of the Fifth meridian, is located the concrete diversion dam and main canal Leadgates of the western section of the Canadian Pacific Railway Arrigation Block. This canal diverts water from Bow river here and

Arrigation Block. This canal diverts water from Bow river here and carries it sixteen miles to Chestermere lake reservoir. For most of its length the main canal is built to carry ten feet of water in a channel fourteen feet deep and having a bed width of forty-four feet.

The district falls within what is known as the "foothill country," a famous ranching area for nearly half a century. The whole expanse is high and rolling with a good growth of native grasses. Being in the area influenced by the chinook winds, snowfalls are light and range stock graze throughout the year requiring little winter feeding.

In the grassy covers and through the light woods the imported Hungarian pheasants have increased rapidly. These, with prairie chickens, ducks in the sloughs, and geese at migrating time, provide good sport in season.

A feature of the map is the manner in which the surface or "lay" of the land is revealed by the use of the contour lines. These are in brown and represent intervals of 25 feet in elevation. A contour is the intersection of a horizontal plane with the surface of a country at any elevation. On topographical maps contour lines are drawn for equal intervals of elevation, and hence indicate steepness or the reverse according as they are crowded together or spread apart. With this map differences of height can be traced for every 25 feet of rise.
