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DEAR SIR,

I wish to obtain information respecting the derivation of the place-names of Canada—of the names of the villages, towns, cities and of the natural features, such as rivers, lakes, capes, bays, mountains, etc.—and shall be much obliged if you will give me any information that you may possess or can procure, respecting the <u>below-mentioned name</u> and also respecting the names of any other features in the vicinity of your residence concerning which you have knowledge.

In many localities, the older generation is passing, or has passed away, and unless steps are taken to collect this information, it will, in many instances, be too late. In most communities there are persons who take an interest in things of this nature or who have been connected with the early settlement of the locality. If there are any such in your neighbourhood, will you kindly submit this to them.

Below I have indicated the lines along which I desire information and also the commoner derivatives of place-names in Canada:—

- (1.) Whether named after a village, town or city, or natural feature in any other province or country; if so, the name of province or country in which the original locality is situated.
- (2.) Whether named after a person; if so, the person's name, occupation, spelling of name as rendered by the person and any details of interest respecting him (or her) such as (a) Whether alive or, if dead, approximate year of death; (b) Whether at any time a resident of the locality and, if so, whether still living there.
- (3.) Whether named after a natural feature; if so, any details respecting the origin of the name as applied to the feature and the geographical position of the latter.
- (4.) Whether the town, village or city ever had any other name or names; if so, at what dates, approximately, and the origin of these obsolete names.

Any information bearing on the above will be deemed a courtesy.

Believed is Situate on the burks of the Grand Timer about - 22 miles north of Guelph and 8 miles north of the Village of Fergus The Land on which Believed now Islands orligenally belonged to beorge Douglas Ferguson of Fergus & was Surveyed by him & his Parliner mir Walt and Known Still as Ferguson & Walt Survey, the Ferguson famely Still retain most of the unoccupied lots in the village Mr Ferguson died about ten years ago In 1856 the village was hamed Douglas for Mr Herguson, & the postoffece was Farafraxa Postoffice then, and retained that name untill The year 1885. Unat being the name of the Township. Garafraxa, Douglas Willage & Garafraxa Postoffice, there is Douglas in the County of Renfrew and hundreds of letters went there every year their in the year 1879 when the Credit-Valley Railway was built-through here now the C.P. R. Elora Branch, a Small Hamlet- 6 miles east of us was Called Garafraxa Station & we had Garafraxa Postoffice & Douglas billage matters then became Serious In Sept-1884 a Court of the Canadian order of Forristers was started here and named court-Belivood no 106 this name was proposed by f. & mennie m. I practising here at that time who afterwards moved to Toronto and died there a few years ago ang 24th 1900 Then it was Considered Belwood would be Sentable name to Call the Willage and drop Douglas Garafraxa Postoffice. In the year 1885 a petition was bent to the Government-asking to have the Change agreed to this was done and we have Believed one I as spelt in the Bible Garafraxa Station was changed to Orton at the same line & since them mistakes are unknown to us mAfampbell assit- P.m.

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
