DEAR SIR,

I wish to obtain information respecting the derivation of the place-names of Canada—of the names of the villages, towns, cities and of the natural features, such as rivers, lakes, capes, bays, mountains, etc.—and shall be much obliged if you will give me any information that you may possess or can procure, respecting the below-mentioned name and also respecting the names of any other features in the vicinity of your residence concerning which you have knowledge.

In many localities, the older generation is passing, or has passed away, and unless steps are taken to collect this information, it will, in many instances, be too late. In most communities there are persons who take an interest in things of this nature or that have been connected with the early settlement of the locality. If there are any such in your neighbourhood, will you kindly submit this to them.

Below I have indicated the lines along which I desire information and also the commoner derivatives of place-names in Canada :—

(1.) Whether named after a village, town, or city, or natural feature in any other province or country ; if so, the name of province or country in which the original locality is situated.

(2.) Whether named after a person ; if so, the person's name, occupation, spelling of name as rendered by the person and any details of interest respecting him (or her) such as (a) Whether alive or, if dead, approximate year of death ; (b) Whether at any time a resident of the locality and, if so, whether still living there.

(3.) Whether named after a natural feature ; if so, any details respecting the origin of the name as applied to the feature and the geographical position of the latter.

(4.) Whether the town, village or city ever had any other name or names ; if so, at what dates, approximately, and the origin of these obsolete names.

Any information bearing on the above will be deemed a courtesy.

Syndhurst a village of about 300 inhabitants is situated on ~~lots~~^{lots} 2 & 3 in the 10 Con. of Gausdown in the County of Leeds (South Riding) Is a thriving village with good water powers and a Reservoir of about 30 Sq miles for a mill Pond, including upper lower Beverly Lakes and Streams, which is supplied from the Rideau Canal (at Morton village) and in fact was formerly the natural outlet or stream from the Rideau. And other Lakes at Newboro before the Canal was made so I am informed by the old inhabitants, and also drains Plumt Hollow Valley which extends for miles North of the village.

I am informed by the old inhabitants it was first called Falls only until about 1830-32 an American Company started a Furnace for smelting Iron, and then it was named or called Furnace Falls, the Iron Ore was got up the stream and close to the shore of Lower Beverly Lake which is part of the mill Pond which gives it a penmanary of water during the dry time of year

Mr. Charles Sutherland who run the furnace being an American, in 1837 & 8. got into difficulty Politically, and the Property was Confiscated, and the Hon^{ble} Charles and Jonas Jones got the Property, and on or about 1845 to 1850 got a mill since, and the name was changed Furnace Falls to Syndhurst, signifying water Fall in the woods or grove which indeed was very appropriate as when I came here in 1853. it was most beautifully surrounded by a fine grove of woods, the property belonged to the Jones estate til I purchased it in 1868. when it was surveyed into a village and commenced selling ~~lots~~ Building lots.

The Industries Comprise, two Grist Mills one an up to date Roller Press; three Saw Mills two Planing & Matching mills - 3 Shingle Mills and a good woollen mill their is also opened a fine Quarry of Granite, of very fine texture & color said to be as good both in color and quality as the Scotch Aberdeen, together with other small industries Blacksmithing Tin Smiths & C. & C. which gives a good Mercantile & other business - trade

The stream abounds in fish Salmon Trout White Fish Bass in abundance & beautiful scenery all down the stream to the Falls
